

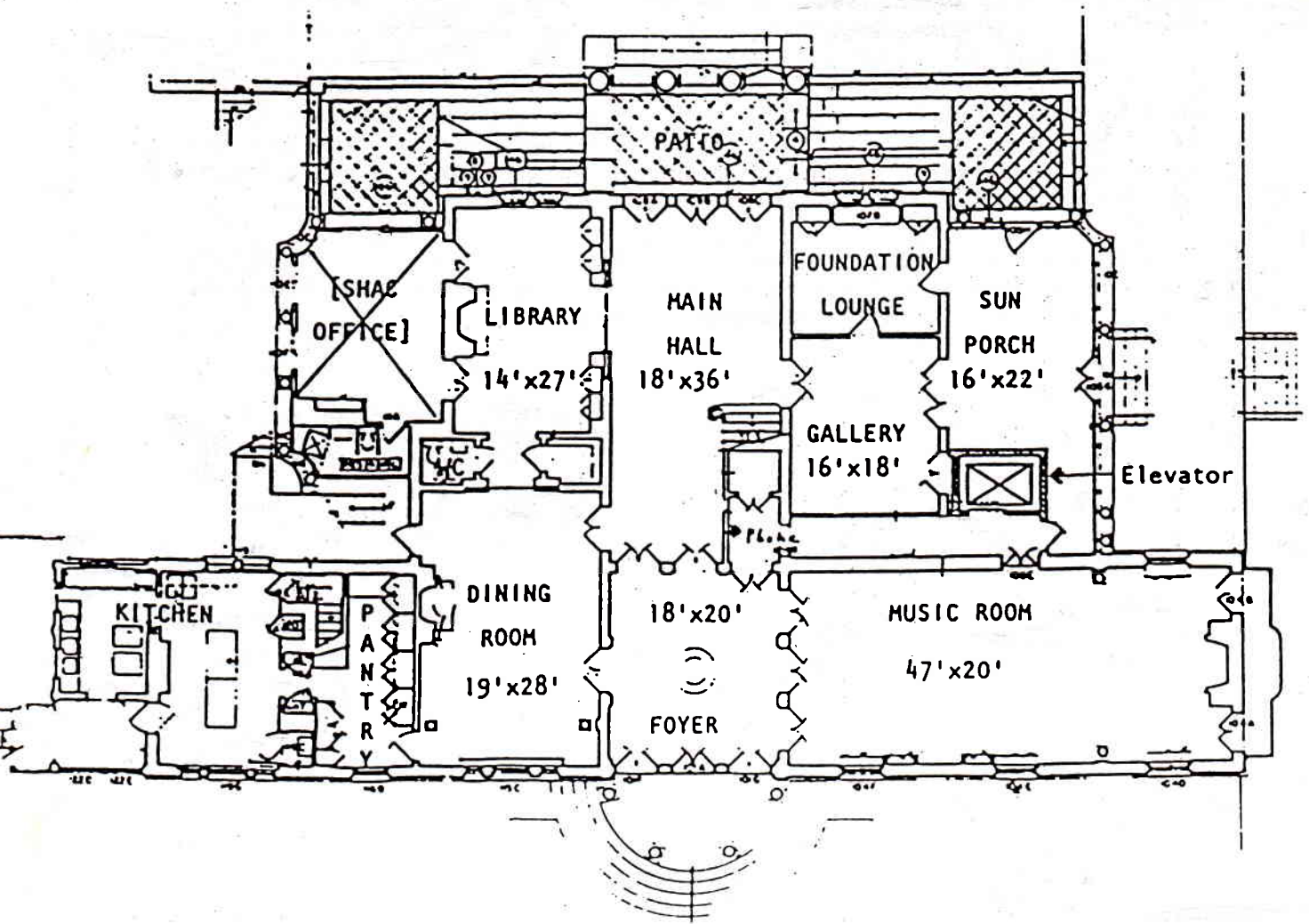

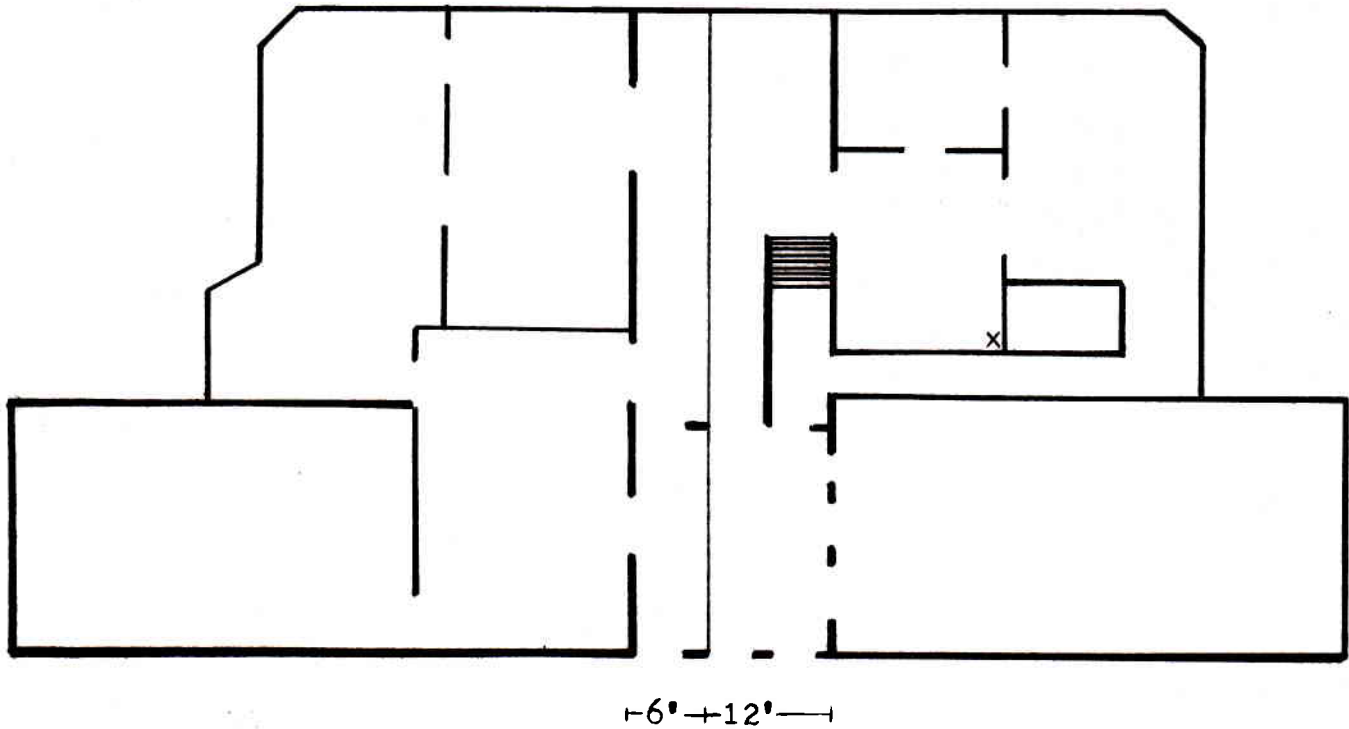

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Strathmore Hall; first floor





— = one piece of very thin, barely visible monofilament, stretched taught approximately seven feet above the floor.

X = miniature speaker (3"x3"x3½") placed unobtrusively in corner, near ceiling; all wires and sound equipment hidden from view. The sound employed consisted of one, extremely soft square wave (fundamental frequency, 466 Hz - Bb⁴), filtered to almost sine tone purity (audible throughout the room in which the speaker was placed but inaudible from any other room).
